

### The Blessing of Using All Our Gifts



When Paul wrote to the Christians living in the ancient city of Corinth he spoke about the community of faith as a body. Each part of that body, no matter how insignificant it seemed, had a role to play in the greater mission that God wanted to accomplish in that city. The body worked best, Paul wrote, when all the body parts did what they were meant to do.

This is still true today! We are all given gifts to use "for the common good", to strengthen the ministry of our church. This definitely is true of St. John's. As your interim priest I see so many of you offering your gifts in worship, in hospitality, in administration, and in outreach. - Leading the Prayers of the People during the service



# Why not dip the bread into the wine? What if I need gluten free wafers?



Let's face it. Covid spooked many of us and has made us much more aware of how bacteria and viruses are transmitted. For some people this means the age-old Christian practice of sharing 'one cup' at Communion seems downright hazardous.

But did you know that the high alcoholic content of Communion wine, together with the silver lining of the chalice, and the practice of wiping and turning the cup as each person receives it, means the risk of transmitting anything harmful is quite low?

However, this low-risk changes when people dip their bread, or wafer, into the chalice. It may *seem* more hygienic, but it is the opposite. This is largely because one must pick up the wafer from one palm with the other hand and then dip it into the wine. Our hands are among the least hygienic parts of our bodies simply because we use them so much throughout the day. They touch multiple surfaces and are used for so many purposes.

This is why handwashing was so stressed during the pandemic. Whatever germs are on your hands will now be on the wafer you are dipping. For this reason, the Diocese of Toronto has asked all churches to remind their members that intinction (dipping) is not permitted.

If you have the sniffles, it's best to just receive the bread at Communion. You can let us know this by simply reaching up and touching the base of the chalice as it is passed in front of you. Alternately, you can cross your arms in front of your chest if you prefer to just receive the bread.

If it has been your normal practice to dip the bread into the wine, please don't be offended in any way. We hope you'll understand that this policy is meant to protect all of us, and to allow us all to focus on the gift that is at the heart of Holy Communion, God's gift of forgiveness and new life in and through Jesus.

Finally, don't be shy if you need gluten free wafers. We always have rice crackers available on the Altar, and these are consecrated right along with the usual wafers. When you come up for Communion just let us know you'd like the gluten free wafers as I administer the bread, and I'll gladly administer this to you.

### Don't Forget St John's This Giving Season - a Note From Our Wardens

On November 1 st we welcomed Reverend Judy Paulsen as our interim Priest-in-Charge and we have been greatly encouraged by her enthusiasm and help given to us as wardens and congregation.

She has reminded us that St John's is an important presence in the community and reaches out in many ways. Sadly, we only have her till the end of this year. We don't have any details yet, but Bishop Shaw is working on who to send us next; as soon as we know something definite, we'll let everyone know.

Wardens have a reputation of being the ones who are always looking for more money, which we do, because one of the roles of a warden is to take care of the temporal things of the church. This means paying our clergy, looking after the upkeep of buildings, making sure bills are paid for utilities etc.

With this in mind we have had to put off some projects which should have been done this past year. We are reminded each time we come to worship that the inside of the church needs attention. The outside of the hall and church needs painting, we need snow clearing in the winter, and there are always surprises which must be given priority.

On the next page, you'll find an update of the analysis we have presented before. The number of donors is creeping up, which is encouraging. Looking at our shortfall per donor per week, the number is down from June, but up a bit again from September.

Therefore, we urge you to prayerfully consider St John's when you are working out your own personal finances, knowing how costs have risen. Think about what St John's community means to you and why you come.

One popular way of giving is through Pre-Authorized Giving (PAR). Many people prefer this option; it guarantees a monthly donation and helps us in preparing the annual budget. There are envelopes which can be taken home and serve as a reminder to give weekly or monthly.

We continue to distribute food outside – on the sidewalk leading up to the Regent Street entrance and on the adjacent lawn. Our volunteers aim to provide our recipients with a reliable source of healthy food in a safe and caring environment.

Here are highlights of a few things that have happened recently....



Several of our food bank volunteers were recognized at the Ontario Volunteer Service Awards ceremony, held on October 16th.

Cathy Pettifer has volunteered with us for 25 years. Faith Bellamy received acknowledgement for 10 years volunteering. Richard and Hilary Nunes, Cathy Smith, and Nancy Charlton received certificates for 5 years volunteering.

On October 31st, Lakefield Village Lions distributed complimentary winter clothing to our recipients. The ladies set up their tents and displayed the clothing. Our food bank recipients eagerly selected coats, sweaters, hats, mittens, and scarves. The event was a huge hit.

We have an awesome group of volunteers that faithfully and joyfully come out each week to do the various tasks to serve our community. For the distribution on October 31st, we had some strange looking characters preparing and distributing food.



It was a blustery day on November 3rd, as teams of volunteers stood outside Lakefield Foodland for a food drive. Volunteers greeted shoppers and encouraged them to donate. Then the food was brought to the food bank to be sorted.

During the week of 13–19 November, several of our volunteers helped with the Tim Hortons Holiday Smile Cookie campaign. It was wonderful to have helping hands to decorate THOUSANDS of cookies each day across Peterborough and County. Through sales of the Holiday Smile Cookie, Tim Hortons raised funds for Kawartha Food Share.

We received a huge amount of food and over \$1,700 in monetary donations from the Santa Claus Parade in Lakefield on November 20th.

### **Sharing Blessings with FaithWorks**

Sunday 26th November was FaithWorks Sunday and if you attended church that morning, you'll have heard about the positive contributions this impactful organization has had – and continues to have – on our community and worldwide.

An initiative of the Anglican Diocese of Toronto, FaithWorks funds ministries that cater to marginalized members of our communities – the Indigenous, the homeless, the hungry, at-risk women/children/youth, immigrants, refugees, and those struggling with HIV/AIDS.

Over the past year, more than 27,000 people were fed, sheltered, nurtured, supported and befriended with support from FaithWorks. With demand for these services rapidly growing, the program is calling on parishes to do even better this year, sparing what they can to live out Christ's words in Matthew 25: 34–36:

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'




### A Hidden Chapel with a Unique History

Hidden Chapel Winery in B.C is a very special place. The vineyard isn't just known for its wines, it's also the site of a tiny wooden church that was painstakingly shipped from Europe and reconstructed on the vineyard property.

The winery's eponymous chapel was brought over in the early 90s as a gift to the previous owner who was apparently very devout but too frail to attend church. Her son-in-law arranged for the building to be transported and tucked away at the back of the property for her private use.

The church seats about six people and is now occasionally used for weddings. It also provides inspiration for the current owners whose wines include 'Nuns on the Run' and 'Blushing Bride'.



If you're ever near Oliver B.C, the Hidden Chapel Winery is well-worth a visit, the little church stole our hearts (and the wine wasn't bad either!).
